Dear valued parents, carers, and members of the community,

Welcome to the 26th edition of the TCS Tribune. This is our termly newsletter dedicated to sharing the activities of the students and staff in our wonderful school with our wider community.

First and foremost, I should like to take this opportunity to congratulate our class of 2025 for their achievements last year. We celebrated these with the students and their families at our Certificate Evening this term. It was fantastic to see the students and hear about what they are studying at college as well as their future plans. The school performance tables, reflecting last year's examination results, have also been recently published by the DfE. Once again, we are proud of being a top performing school in the area with students achieving an average point score in their qualifications that is almost 8 points above the Local Authority average and 7.3 points above the National average.

This term has been busy with activity including open mornings and evening our community fireworks display, our Christmas Fayre, the completion and opening of our two new classrooms, Remembrance and many more. There have been a range of trips

and visits including the half term voyage with the Ocean Youth Trust and adventurous trip to the Brecon Beacons which really brought out the leadership skills of our students. We've also had visits to the Wessex Rivers Trust, a careers fayre, Baylab, Bright Sparks (Music), the Power Boat Challenge, and so much more. All of this has taken place around the day-to-day running of the school where children will have participated in around 400,000 lessons and Year 11 have completed their mock exams! You can read more about many of these things in this addition of the Tribune.

I would like to thank parents and carers for supporting us by making donations and attending our events such as the fireworks display, the Christmas Fayre and our new tutor time initiative. Without you and the wonderful PTFA volunteers we wouldn't be able to run these amazing events.

In a landscape of significantly falling student roles in primary schools, and very few children in our catchment, we have 267 applications for places at Testbourne. This demonstrates the confidence our community and surrounding communities have in our school for which we are very grateful.

Over the past 12 months, we have been working on more clearly communicating our culture, ethos and mission to parents, students and staff. All of these are combined in what we call "The Testbourne Way". The components of The Testbourne Way can be found in the graphic below:



The outer layer contains our Standards of Excellence. These are the personal characteristics we expect of students and encourage them to demonstrate. They form the basis of our recognition system. The middle layer describes our mission: to help children become independent, resilient and responsible. We know that by helping students develop these skills, we best prepare them for their future; it is this philosophy that ensures Testbourne students are college-ready when they leave us and the reason why our local colleges speak so highly of Testbourne Students. The inner layer indicates that all of this is underpinned by the warm, positive relationships between staff and students and indeed all members of our community. Positive relationships are required for students to thrive.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank parents and carers for their continued support with uniform, punctuality and attendance. School attendance is currently 94.1% which is a significant improvement on last year and the highest since the pandemic. We know that good attendance is key to success in many measures, not just exam results, and it's only with the support of families that attendance has improved. The students deserve a big well done for their achievements in this area too.

Students should also be celebrated for their fantastic behaviour and attitudes throughout this term. They are a credit to the school and their parents or carers. At the time of writing, your children have earned almost 35,000 recognition points and Oak house is leading the way with 9526. You can find a full house breakdown by reading ahead.

Every half term, I write Headteacher recognition letters for two children nominated in each year group for being fantastic examples of the Testbourne Standards of Excellence. This is always a great pleasure and gives me opportunity to focus on children who are very representative of Testbourne students: polite, kind, thoughtful, resilient and hard working. GCSE Exam Results 2025

Congratulations Class of 2025!

We are thrilled to celebrate the incredible success of our Year 11 students in their GCSE examinations this year. The Class of 2025 has truly set a high standard and their hard work and determination have paid off in remarkable ways.

This year, students achieved an impressive 161 top grades at level 8 or 9 across all subjects. More than one in six students earned at least one grade 9, the highest possible mark. In fourteen subjects, over seventy five percent of grades were between 9 and 4, reflecting consistent excellence across the curriculum. Core subjects saw outstanding results with 85% of students achieving grades 9 to 4 in English and 84% reaching the same benchmark in Mathematics. Science was another area of distinction. Across Biology, Chemistry and Physics, students secured 103 grades between 9 and 7 and 86% achieved grades 9 to 4 in two or more sciences. Over half of our students studied the full EBacc suite of subjects, demonstrating a commitment to a broad and balanced education. We are also proud to report that students with Education, Health and Care Plans made above average progress in their EBacc subjects, a testament to the inclusive and supportive environment at our school.

You should all be so proud of how far you've come and the hard work you've put into your GCSEs over the past few years. Thank you for being part of the TCS family, and you will all continue to be a huge part of our community beyond your time here as students. We wish you all success in your futures ahead.









Open Evening 2025

Our annual Open Evening in September is always one of the busiest and most exciting events of the year. Hundreds of parents and students visit to explore the fantastic opportunities available at Testbourne Community School. Earlier this term, we were thrilled to host another successful evening, which would not have been possible without the incredible support of our student volunteers. These students played a key role in welcoming guests and guiding them around the many activities we had set up around the different departments. One of our student volunteer's even shared their thoughts on the event:

We welcomed a lot of families into school for a tour of the site, with visitors having the opportunity to speak to staff before or after the tours. Visitors gave wonderful feedback about how articulate, polite and kind the tour guides were, and we are very proud of the sterling job that they did.



Visitors were also impressed with the school's calm and purposeful atmosphere when walking around site. In January we will be inviting existing parents to have a tour of the school, so please watch out for this invitation soon. Wessex Rivers Trust Visit

Our Year 9 students recently stepped out of the classroom and into the great outdoors for an exciting Geography fieldwork experience. As part of their studies on ecosystems and biomes, they partnered with the Wessex Rivers Trust to investigate the health of our local chalk stream at Millennium Meadow.

During the trip, students applied a range of fieldwork techniques, including kick sampling, habitat observations, and water temperature testing. These hands-on activities allowed them to assess the river's condition and gain a deeper understanding of the vital role chalk streams play in supporting biodiversity.

The day was a fantastic success, showcasing learning beyond the classroom. A huge well done to all our students for their excellent behaviour, curiosity, and enthusiasm throughout the experience. This fieldwork not only strengthened their geographical knowledge but also highlighted the importance of caring for our local environment.

Sailing with the Ocean Youth Trust



Fourteen Testbourne students kicked off their half term with an unforgettable adventure aboard Prolific, the sail training ship operated by Ocean Youth Trust South. Over four nights, they navigated the Solent, braving blustery winds and rain showers while learning the ropes in every sense. From hoisting sails and setting up mooring lines to cooking meals for twenty two people in the ship's galley, the students embraced every challenge. Living in close quarters with the crew taught them teamwork and resilience, and evenings were filled with games and laughter after busy days at sea.

The voyage began on Friday evening with introductions and safety briefings. By Saturday morning, they were ready to set sail on a windy beam reach to Lymington, practicing tacks and even venturing onto the bowsprit. A man overboard drill capped off the day, followed by dinner and games under a rainbow sky. Sunday brought a guided tour of Lymington before the group sailed downwind to Portsmouth, mastering gybes along the way. Monday focused on theory including knots, weather, boat parts and safety before the students planned and executed a sunset voyage back to Southampton, navigating in the dark with impressive skill.

In total, they covered seventy eight nautical miles and every student earned the RYA Start Yachting certificate, a nationally recognised qualification. Beyond sailing skills, this achievement reflects vital transferable skills such as teamwork, problem solving, perseverance and adaptability. Students learned to cope with unfamiliar situations, take responsibility and support one another, skills that will serve them well in life. A huge thank you to Prolific's skipper and the volunteer sea staff who made this experience possible. The next sailing voyage is scheduled for Easter 2026, an opportunity not to be missed!





Brecon Beacons Geography Trip

Our GCSE Geography students traded the classroom for the breathtaking landscapes of the Brecon Beacons!





Our students had an incredible opportunity to attend the London Philharmonic Orchestra's Bright Sparks Concert at the Royal Festival Hall. They performed a range of music that would help further musical knowledge in line with the GCSE music syllabus. The concert was accompanied by a very knowledgeable compère and was an interactive experience, with quizzes and information appearing on the screen behind the orchestra as the music was being played.

The concert had something for everyone, with music from 1700s right up to the 2000s; it catered for musicians of all levels, using the wide range of musical vocabulary that our students need to know at GCSE level. Bright Sparks is part of the London Philharmonic Orchestra's education programme, and we hope to be successful in the ticketing ballot for future performances.

New Modular Building

We're thrilled to announce that over the October half-term work was completed on two brand-new modular classrooms, bringing fresh learning spaces to our school community. Alongside this, we also made improvements to our outdoor areas, including an extended canteen patio and a new canopy to create a welcoming outdoor seating space for students.



Robotics Club and Lego

A team of ten Year 8 students have been taking part in a Robotics Club learning how to program using Lego Spike Prime. They will be using these skills to take part in the first Lego League Challenge tournament in March 2026.

The challenge is a global STEM programme for teams of young people, to encourage an interest in real world themes and develop key skills that are crucial for their future careers. This year the theme of the challenge is 'Unearthed'. The team has been researching issues relating to archaeology and explorinng ways in science and innovation may aid archeologists in their field.

Anti Bullying Week

We were delighted to host anti-bullying week as part of the national campaign. Monday 14th November. It was fantastic to see students arrive to school in odd socks to show their support and allegiance to the campaign against bullying. This year Testbourne signed the anti-bullying pledge in support of the anti-bullying alliance. This shows how seriously we take bullying and how we support the wider cause for children and young people across the UK. During the week we also hosted a range of activities. Students in their PD lessons enjoyed watching a theatre production called "Hope" endorsed by the Anti-Bullying Alliance. The purpose of this was to help educate students on the impact of bullying and how it can have a lifelong impact on both victim and perpetrator. Across the school students completed a range of tasks in lesson all focussing on the theme of anti-bullying but in particular how we can use our power for good and how bullying



can have a significant impact on our social, emotional and mental wellbeing. In our tutor programme that week, students also completed a range of activities and have produced their own poems and captions about bullying and how we can use our power for good.

Hampshire FA 3G ATP Pitch of

We're proud to announce that Testbourne has been awarded the Hampshire FA 3G ATP Pitch of the Year! This prestigious award celebrates the highest-quality artificial playing surfaces across Hampshire. Winners are chosen by a panel of industry experts, including Hampshire FA's facilities team and partners such as Technical Surfaces, heres what they had to say:

"Testbourne's 3G Pitch was officially opened in March 2019. It is a much valued and much used resource for the community and is hugely beneficial in developing grassroots sport at a local level. The pitch provides the school's PE Department with a first-class facility, enabling activities to take place in all weathers. The local community and sports organisations enjoy the opportunity to play on a FA registered pitch and provide sport and physical activity for all. Partner clubs including Whitchurch FC and Overton Youth FC are fantastic clubs to work alongside and their membership numbers in both girls' and boys' teams have increased vastly over the last 4 years. The Testbourne Site Team are committed to ensuring that the pitch is well maintained all year round and the school and partner clubs are incredibly grateful for their efforts.



Testbourne Riders Shine in National Equestrian Competi-

Testbourne Community School is celebrating equestrian success as two talented students proudly represent the school in competitions across the region. Gemma O delivered an outstanding performance at the School Equestrian Games One Day Event held at Calmsden, securing 1st place in the 90cm class riding Sunkist, and earning a coveted qualification spot for the 2026 Championships. She continued her strong run by placing 12th on her horse Rio in the 100cm class. Rio remained in excellent form at the NSEA (National Schools Equestrian Association) Arena Eventing competition at Rectory Farm, where the pair achieved a clear round and finished 7th in the 90cm event. The school also celebrated a confident performance from Catherine E, who competed in the 50cm class on her pony Lucky Boy, showcasing promising talent and enthusiasm for the sport.
