Dear valued Parents, Carers and members of the community,

We have had clubs up and running this term, including the gardening club who enthusiastically take care of the Jubilee Garden behind my office. We have been doing a managed "re-wilding" of the garden to provide a haven for pollinating insects and birds.

As part of our commitment to promoting women's sport, Mrs Harper, Mr Roberts, Mrs Vallance and Mrs Chewins took a group of 30 children from all year groups to see Monday's euro match in Southampton. Year 10 students who remained in school for Work Experience week experienced life at Testbourne from a completely different perspective. We weren't students, we were research employees!

On day one we were greeted by support staff who keep the school working smoothly behind the scenes and work tirelessly with integrity day in and day out. They explained their career journeys which were all unique and mildly surprising. speaking and taken on a Health & Safety site inspection, to highlight potential areas of risk in preparation for the termly Governors' Report.

Throughout the week, we completed virtual work experiences with Coca-Cola and Merlin Entertainments, prepared our CVs, learnt about the workplace and how to be confident, work as a team, problem solving and the importance of communication, productivity and working to deadlines.

We also had the privilege of hearing from several guest speakers, including the farm manager and owner of Laverstoke Park, a neo natal nurse, a TV presenter, a specialist paramedic from London Ambulance Service, a professor of forensic science, as well as an employment judge from Southampton Courts. They certainly made us take note of the various academic pathways we can follow and gave us an insight into their world of work.

Overall, this week equipped participants like me with the skills we will use in the future when becoming the successful businessmen/women we are all capable of being. Personally, I feel more confident with making decisions about my future and can't wait to experience whatever life throws at me because now, I feel prepared.

Year 5 Testbourne Experience Visits

On Tuesday 28th June and Wednesday 6th July, Testbourne Community School hosted Year 5 students from all around the area. I was one of the Year 9 students who helped out with these experience days, and we wanted to show off the school as the preferred option for them to pick as their secondary school. The children were all given a variety of different lessons to take part in so they could establish a real feel of how the school was run and the different methods used to teach within it.

Our job was to supervise them and ensure they got to the right lessons at the right times. We then stayed with them and offered support to the teachers if they needed help with small jobs, or with practical work. The whole day



was centred around a book series called 'Adventures on Trains' and every lesson followed this theme, with trains running around the planet, and even into space.

My group's schedule consisted of lessons in Science, Art and MFL. In Science, a practical experiment was conducted on the properties of some 'space dust'. A series of tests were set up to determine these properties like magnetism, pH, and solubility. The Year 5 students enjoyed using the scientific apparatus and finding out where in the solar system the space dust came from.

In Art, the visiting students looked at an interesting style of work which consisted of imprinting images on to adhesive tape to make them transparent. The image was transmitted by using water to rub off the paper from the back of the tape. From asking a few of the Year 5s after the lesson, they really enjoyed the freedom and creativity of this lesson.



The MFL experience was a French lesson, the language which I learn, so I was able to help with learning and pronouncing the phrases correctly. The main theme of this lesson was travel and holidays, so we mainly learnt phrases to do with that. It included a pronunciation game and 'Simon Says'. Near the end, we also played snap with pictures cards and the phrases, and ended with a game of 'heads down, thumbs up'. Overall, the lesson was extremely interactive and was thoroughly enjoyed by all of the students.

In my opinion both days were huge successes. Lots of the Year 5 students rated it as 10/10 on the evaluation forms, while some of them gave their day even more than 10/10, which was fantastic. They appreciated all the Year 9 helpers, and explained how comfortable they now felt with the school. One of them even told me they'd definitely be coming to Testbourne and they wanted to find me when they got there. I really enjoyed the whole day and I'm glad I could help the Year 5 children enjoy the experience.


New Testbourne Prefect Team

Year 10 Andover College Taster Day

On Thursday 7th of July, Year 10 students were invited to Andover College Taster Day to explore the possible courses available and get some experience of College life. There were a variety of opportunities and therefore all students had a taste of what life could be like at a College. A few weeks prior to the event, we each chose a career pathway which incorporated three workshops: each a subject relating to the career.

Choosing the pathway 'Design', I had a taster of the A-level courses: 3D Design, Film Making and Graphic Communication. In 3D Design we learnt about the importance of using cheaper materials for models and prototypes and created a walkway using aluminium foil, cocktail sticks and Styrofoam. Next in Film Making we created props that could be used on stage. Finally in Graphic Communication, we had the opportunity to see the work of previous students and learn about the course, before designing our own poster using different graphic design techniques.

We could have also chosen workshops including hairdressing and make up, bricklaying, social sciences, education, criminal justice, art and design and many more. These subjects helped us to grasp what this college and many others would be like, and we are all grateful to have had the insight into life beyond Testbourne. Overall, it was a good experience meeting teachers and learning more about the different courses at the college.

Employer Engagement Project – Mathematics

I am delighted to share with you the experience that some of our students had when taking part in the Employer Engagement Project during some of their Maths lessons.

The aim of the project was to enable students to better understand how the knowledge learnt in the classroom could be applied to the world of work, which in turn helps to engage and focus young people in the subject of mathematics. This year we started the programme with some Year 9 students and we are now looking to extend this excellent opportunity to more groups next year. Each of the online Teams sessions lasted 50 minutes, the duration of a normal Maths lesson. This allowed time for pre and post evaluation forms to be



completed by the students. Below is an overview of each Employer Engagement Project sessions that our students took part in, one presented by Microsoft and the other by Pall.

- 1) Microsoft
 - Introduction to Microsoft and making computer games.
 - The background to the roles of sampling and probability in making games.
 - GCSE questions on probability using the example of creating an Army game.
 - Q&A about the company, roles, pathways & the 'Employable Me' skills needed.
- 2) Pall (A company also involved in the development of a Covid vaccine)
 - Introduction to PALL.
 - What is Gene Therapy? Its role in creating vaccines to defend against viruses.
 - Use of algebra & equations in creating vaccines.
 - GCSE questions on Algebra and Equations using real world examples.
 - Q&A about the company, roles, pathways & the 'Employable Me' skills needed.

This was an excellent opportunity to help students understand how their classroom mathematics can be used in the 'real' world, thus enhancing their engagement in class. The classroom sessions also meet the Gatsby careers provision benchmarks 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 and CDI (Career Development Frameworks).

EBP South, the organisers of the Project, asked students, teachers and businesses (Microsoft and Pall) to feedback on the impact of the Project through pre and post evaluation forms. Following the sessions 97% of the students felt more confident in topics like Probability and Sampling and understood the link between working hard in school and the career choices/opportunities they will have in the future.

Our students also did very well in the sessions. The employer at Microsoft had the following to say about our students:

"Incredible session, the students grasped all concepts so quickly that we had a lot more time to apply them in different scenarios with alternative approaches. It is a great pleasure when I meet students with such talent."



STEM Day


On Wednesday 13th July all Year 7 students were off timetable to take part in a STEM day (Science Technology Engineering Maths).

Year 7 & 8 District

Just before half term, Testbourne took a team of students to Charlton Athletics track to compete in the District athletics competition. Students are selected for individual events and have the opportunity to score, which are then added together throughout the day to complete overall team results. This is split in to two categories: Year 9 boys and girls and Year 10 boys and girls. Testbourne's Year 9 team finished in 6th place and the Year 10s finished in 4th place overall.



Highlights from the day include:

Year 9s: Oliver S. finished 1st in the long jump with a jump of 4.57m; Ted T. finished 1st in the triple jump at 10.05m; Poppy T. (Year 8) finished 1st in the 800m with a time of 2m 25s.

Year 10s: Charlotte V. was 1st in the 800m with a time of 2m 22s; Madison N. and Eva K. finished 1st and 2nd in the long jump, jumping 3.53m and 3.38m respectively; Izzy P. threw 8.49m, finishing 1st in the shot. In the boys' team, Ollie C. (discus) and Jake F. (javelin) both finished 3rd with throws of 20.56m and 28.63m.

All of the students mentioned above qualified to represent Andover at the County Championships that was held on the 11th June in Portsmouth.

County Champs Year 7,8,9,10

There are two separate days for the County Championships. The Year 9-11 competition took place in Portsmouth on June 11th, and the Year 7&8 day was held in Southampton on 13th July. As Andover's Team Manager, I had the privilege to accompany our selected athletes to each of the two championships. It is a real 'step up' in terms of the level of competition, but all our students challenged themselves to compete to the best of their ability.

Year 9-11 + Exceptional Year 8 Students.

The girls' 800m event included heats and finals. Poppy T. sailed through her heat and found herself in a top-class field of athletics for the final. She finished in 2nd place, in a time of 2.21.4 an excellent result considering she is only in Year 8. Charlotte V. also finished in 2nd place in a time of 2m21 in 800m in the Intermediate girls' category. Eva K. and Madison N. took part in the Intermediate girls long jump competition; both girls set new PBs, with Eva jumping a phenomenal distance of 4.93m and finishing in 4th place. Madison finished 11th with a jump of 3.74m.

Unfortunately, the other qualified athletes were unable to make it on the day.

Year 7/8 Competition

Seven students attended the very hot day at Southampton. Tajay S. (Year 8) was first to run in the 300m, finishing in 6th place overall. Ed H. (Year 7) just missed out by 0.1 of a second in qualifying for the 80m final. Ben C., who has only been throwing the javelin for a short period of time, managed a respectable 25.27m, finishing in 4th place overall: with a little bit more practice, who knows how far he might throw it in the future! Gemma O. (Year 7) took part in the 600m, finishing with a time of 2m 11s and Holly P. (Year 7) finished in 10th place in the long jump. Kate H. ran in the Year 8 girls' 100m, finishing in 5th place in her heat.
