TEAM MITYANA 2017

On the 12th October, fourteen students, including myself, set off on a trip of a lifetime to Uganda. It was an eye-opening experience. We made children happy, changed lives and made special memories that we will treasure for the rest of our lives.

Here are some of the thoughts and reflections of my fellow Team Uganda members.

The two weeks we were there were filled with different things to do and places to go. We saw so many new things and met so many inspirational people.

The first part of the trip was amazing and educational, I felt I learnt a lot about a completely different culture and made some good friends.

The Safari was incredible, seeing the big five, making up our own songs and feeding chimps on the equator.

It was interesting going into their lessons and seeing how different our schools were. Even though it was extremely hard, I thoroughly enjoyed water carrying. I still find it hard to believe that many of them have to do this every day before school and they get up at 4am!

It showed me that I can be selfish and overdramatic, and that I don't have to be. That life isn't always a competition, that at the end of the day people don't like you because of what you've got – it's because of who you are.

What I learnt about myself is that I do not need a lot to live a good life and I take far too many things for granted.

I learnt that Uganda is a great country which far too few people know about. The people are so welcoming and appreciate you being there. However, the poverty needs to be stopped as there are a lot of people without basic needs like clean water.

My first thoughts are about the Ugandan people we met. They appeared to have so little in terms of material wealth but were so much happier with their lot than we appear to be in the UK.

I felt unbelievably fortunate for what I have as I saw some people and children that had such little clothing and no shoes and living in cramped surroundings. It made me reflect on how I may have a small home, but nevertheless I live in a safe environment with a roof over my head.

When I filled out my application form nearly two years ago I had no idea how much this experience would teach me. I loved meeting everyone and hearing all of their inspirational stories. It really shocked me when I found out how hard their lives are and how hard it is to go to school.

Overall the trip was a great experience and I loved every minute of it. I also enjoyed the fundraising we had to do. I would really recommend it to anyone who is thinking about going.


Year 9 Girls' FOOTBALL VICTORY!

UPCOMING EVENTS: SCIENCE New Head of Science – Dr Richard Wilson



As the new Head of Science at Testbourne, I am proud to be able to write about the exciting upcoming events within the department and some of the fantastic achievements our students have celebrated in Science during this first term.

For the first time, we invited some of our year 7 and 8 students to assist at Open Evening, alongside our year 9 and 10 students, who did a brilliant job demonstrating practical techniques to prospective students and their parents. These students showed exceptional levels of pride and professionalism during their demonstrations, which was highlighted by many of our visitors in their feedback. Our Science Club and STEM groups continue to go from strength to strength, with lab 43 regularly packed out on Tuesday afternoons with scientists who are keen to investigate beyond the classroom! To recognise the many student successes across the department, we have introduced the Scientist of the Month award; a student from each class is nominated by their class teacher to recognise outstanding achievement, with students receiving a letter home to congratulate them, along with a star on the class success board.

I look forward to meeting many of you over the course of the year.

SCIENCE CLUB

Mr Ayling has a number of exciting investigations and practical demonstrations planned for Science Club. If you are interested in joining Science Club, come and see Mr Ayling in room 43 on Tuesdays after school.

In Science club they have been working on producing their own show aimed at year 5 and 6. They have been examining a variety of exciting and spectacular demonstrations and experiments to put together a selection of the best ones they would like to show off to local primary schools. Now they have selected their favorites a group of them are now putting together a script ready for a show in the new year.

This week we started a new project looking at fossils, the students will chemically digest some rock and sieve it to examine its microfossil content, hopefully finding some exciting things and creating a picture of an ecosystem 140 million years old.

STEM CLUB

Many students are now finishing the research stages of their Teen Tech Projects which cover subjects such as designing an Eco-town, including a bus which runs on human poo, the use of hydrogen peroxide to produce energy, a device to alert users to fire and an app to help teach people to drive. We are looking forward to seeing how these ideas progress before they enter the competition in March.

YEAR 10 SCIENCE TRIP TO SOUTHAMPTON UNIVERSITY

In early November, our Year 10 students participated in a KS4 Interactive Physics problem-solving workshop at Southampton University.

The workshops provided some stimulating and challenging tasks to explore issues of fundamental Physics and Astronomy. They analysed real data from stars in our galaxy to determine their rotation and orbital period. A leading Astronomer, Professor Jocelyn Bell Burnell, then treated the students to a fascinating lecture about her discovery of pulsating stars for which she was awarded a Nobel Prize, where she emphasised the need for hard work and resilience to achieve your goals. This was a public lecture with world leading academics from Physics and Astronomy. Our students asked some very insightful questions, representing the school and themselves in a credible manner. This was again raised by parents at the recent Year 10 parents evening. Hopefully, this opportunity will encourage our students to have the highest expectations of themselves and consider possible Science careers.

At the end of the last half-term 37 students studying Spanish took part in a Language and Culture visit to Madrid.

The group travelled by plane from Heathrow to Madrid on Wednesday evening and enjoyed three full days in the Spanish capital before returning on Sunday. Our hotel was conveniently situated right in the centre of the city, just two minutes from the Plaza de la Puerta de Sol. This made exploring and finding our way around really easy. The students soon became experts on the layout of the centre of the city and quickly felt at home. For visits which were a bit further out we used the public metro system and even a cable car to the Casa del Campo.

The students might have thought they had signed up for a holiday, but found themselves with early morning calls on Thursday and Friday as their lessons in a local language school started at 9.00 a.m. They really enjoyed the lessons which helped to increase their confidence when speaking Spanish and also provided them with some practical language to help them make the most of their visit to Spain. Teaching also covered material which they will be able to use in the Speaking and Writing parts of their GCSE exams.

After lessons and lunch, it was time to explore the city. The sights visited included the Plaza Mayor, The Royal Palace, The Museo de Arte Reina Sofia where Picasso's famous "Guernica" is housed along with other outstanding and well known pieces of art from the last century. One of the highlights for football fans was the visit to the impressive Estadio Santiago Bernabéu, home of Real Madrid. We also took in some more traditional Spanish culture at the Plaza de Toros de las Ventas bullring. Whilst a visit to an actual bullfight was never going to be on the cards, it was interesting to get a sense of the importance of the Corrida de Toros in Spanish culture.



Our evening meals were taken in the restaurants in and around the Plaza Mayor. I was really pleased to see the students trying and enjoying traditional Spanish food – even if the odd McDonalds was also consumed!

Our time in Madrid soon came to an end but we left with some wonderful memories. I hope the students will be able to return one day and share fond memories of this visit. I would like to thank them for their exemplary behaviour and positive attitude throughout. Their teachers at the language school also said that they had been a pleasure to work with. Thank you also to Miss Lord, Miss Boukari, Mrs Davies and Mr Naylor without whom the visit would not have been able to take place.








NON-UNIFORM DAY AT TCS
