Dear Valued Parents, Carers and Members of the Community,

I am delighted to welcome you to the fourth full edition of the *TCS Tribune* as we rapidly approach the end of the Autumn term. This is our termly newsletter dedicated to sharing the activities of the students and staff in our wonderful school with our wider community. As usual, there is no shortage of material when it comes to the events that have taken place and the achievements of our students.

This has been a very busy and significant term, punctuated most significantly by the Year 11 mock exams. The Year 11 students have been exceptional in their attitude to the exams, their behaviour and their conduct. In fact, their organisation and acceptance of the routines we use has meant we have even been able to start some exams early. If you are the parent of a Year 11 child, please do echo the positive messages about mocks that I have already given them. The mock exams will provide vital analytical information to help focus targeted teaching sessions and revision strategies for our students through the Spring term and into the summer.

During this term, we have also focused on developing our infrastructure. We have successfully 'ported' our email and website to a testbourne.school address making contacting us and finding us online more convenient. You will have also noticed the new website design, new branding and our video prospectus. These are all part of our vision to provide a professional and corporate image for all users of our site. Additionally, we have installed a new suite of desktop computers in one of our design technology rooms to respond to the demands of the new specifications and provide a higher quality learning experience for our students in this subject.

One of the most momentous occasions in the term has been the much-anticipated handover of the 3G pitch to the school. The pitch is one of the most advanced of its kind, meeting the specifications of FIFA to gain FIFA accreditation. The surface is astonishing and I recommend that parents and members of the community have a look from the side-lines or make a booking to experience it first-hand. Students have enthusiastically reported their experiences so far. We are looking forward to the official opening of the pitch when the weather improves.



There have been a significant number of events that you can read about in detail in this publication. One that particularly sticks in my mind is our Remembrance assembly. The assembly was largely organised by students who are members of uniformed organisations. It was a hugely respectful occasion with emotive performances and readings by students and inspirational and reflective readings from Mr Lovegrove. There were also specific memories shared by students. The assembly is held every year, involves the whole school and is an extremely emotional occasion. I would encourage any member of the community who has or has had an attachment to the uniformed services to contact the school if they would like to attend. It is a revelation that contradicts much of the bad press young people receive today.

Our PTFA have been very hard at work this term. We are extremely grateful for the support they are giving us in raising funds for a long overdue refurbishment of the PE changing rooms. You may have attended the Christmas fair held on Saturday 1st December so you will be pleased to know that over £3000 was raised for the cause. The PTFA also provided much of the funding for our 'Blue Box' – the new catering outlet in the school.

A number of awards were also presented throughout the evening; Individual Subject Awards, Most Progress, Achievement, Highest Attendance, Governors Award for Effort and Headteacher's Award as well special mentions to the Head Boy and Head Girl. They were presented with glass awards which they can treasure for years to come and remember their achievements.

It was a fantastic celebration of the efforts our students put in during their time at Testbourne. They attended this formal occasion looking very smart and enjoyed talking to their friends, staff and parents.

AMAZING GCSE PERFORMANCE!

The official national school performance tables have now been released by the government with the provisional data for every school in the country. The main headlines are:

^A measure that takes children's average point score for their best 8 GCSE grades including English and Maths, a Science, Humanities and/or Language and three additional subjects.

Lest We Forget Remembrance Service

On Friday 9th November, we held an assembly to commemorate 100 years since "the guns fell silent" at the end of World War I.

The assembly opened with a procession from the Overton Army Cadets and Winchester Sea Cadets. Personal memories of staff and students' families were shared with the whole school. The readings of







the poem 'For the Fallen' and 'In Flander's Fields' were very emotional and 11 o'clock was marked by 'The Last Post' played by a student, which brought tear to the eyes of many who were there.

Each tutor group presented a handmade wreath in memory of those who died, and these were displayed in school afterwards.

The Remembrance service is a hugely important ceremony for the school and its community. Many of our staff and students have ancestors who fought in the wars and gave their lives for the freedom we all enjoy today. All students demonstrated outstanding behaviour and huge amounts of respect in the assembly.

Poppy Display



SSIF Schools' Conference



Twenty Year 11 students attended an inspiring Student conference on Monday 5th November 2018 to help raise their aspirations and help them prepare more effectively for their forthcoming GCSE exams.

The conferences have been established after Basingstoke secondary schools received additional financial support following a successful bid to the Department of Education (DfE). Allocated from the DfE's Strategic School Improvement Fund (SSIF), the money is being used to further improve GCSE education in the area, enabling more students to achieve good results in their exams. The skills being learnt will also provide the foundations for further academic achievement at A-level and widening training and employment opportunities when students leave secondary school at age 16. Part of the money is being used to give a small number of students the chance to take part in a learning conference. Teachers also attend the conference in order to bring back ideas into school so that all students can benefit from the work being done.






TCS IT UPDATE

IT Manager - Mr J Worth

There have been some significant changes and improvements to the school IT infrastructure, most noticeable of which is the migration of the email platform and addresses to **testbourne.school**. This brings many improvements such as much shorter email addresses, easier login process and the integration of



Investment in improving access to IT and in line with the current needs for Design Technology (DT) has meant that one of our DT rooms has been partially converted to house 24 high performance PCs with large monitors to allow for complex graphic design and modelling. Many behind the scenes improvements have been made to further improve the school's network infrastructure as well.

The school website has been completely revamped to bring it in line with current school standards and to improve access to school information. Further, the integrated calendar on the website is synchronised in real time from school so dates of school holidays, events, etc. are always up to date.

We are currently investigating the numerous different applications and services that Office 365 provides such as SharePoint and Teams, to help improve teaching and learning as well as student/teacher



collaboration. We are also beginning to make use of these new services to help reduce administration workload and allow teams of support staff to collaborate on major school events. Soon we will be making more use of these cloud systems to help

support our responsive approach to teaching as well as creating a consistent and cohesive learning experience for all our students.



Office 365

Initial feedback from students and staff regarding the use of SharePoint and Teams has been very promising. The Headteacher's PA is our unofficial cloud champion and has been working with me to improve and develop new ways of working.

All students can download the full Microsoft Office application suite to their home computers free of charge whilst they are on roll here at Testbourne. To do so, login to Office 365 as normal by going to <u>http://portal.office.com</u> and click "Install Office" and select "Office 365 Apps". Please note that the school cannot provide support with any installation issues on personal devices nor can it take responsibility for any data loss, change to computer configuration etc. that could occur as a result.

Please can I ask you to remind your child(ren) that they must log on to their school email regularly as many teachers are sending work via email to students; and some communications (such as exam time-tables) are being sent directly to students.

FANTASTIC 3G PITCH NOW OPEN AT TCS

Our amazing all weather pitch is now open and in full use by students and the local community. We are



so pleased with the quality of it and how great it looks. It has been a huge undertaking and we have been extremely lucky to get grant funding for the project.

The maintenance specification is very high so it's really important that extra care is taken by all users to look after the pitch and preserve the top quality standard. Correct footwear needs to be worn at all times and it needs to be kept clean of litter and debris.

School Council News

The School Council have been very busy this term with a re-organisation as well as recruiting new members from younger year groups. Three groups have been set up aiming to improve our life at Testbourne.

Allotment Group:

This term, the allotment group have been preparing for the construction and planting of the new school allotment; due to the Winter Season, the main planning will commence in January 2019. The allotment will be used to produce vegetables and herbs for the school's Food Technology department and a compost bin added for school food waste. Also this term, the allotment group have been working on the tree-planting project, which happened on Saturday 15th December; this was to commemorate the 64 men from Whitchurch who died in World War One, by planting 64 birch trees, lining a pathway in Whitchurch in two parallel lines. Birch trees have been chosen because they are symbolic and are also environmentally friendly as they absorb a lot of pollution.

Eco-Action Group:

The Eco-Action group have also been very busy this term, they have been doing several assemblies to promote their new projects around school. They have introduced Terracycle Pen Recycling, where the students have given each teacher a plastic wallet to recycle old pens; they have provided new bins in the playgrounds which are specifically for plastic bottles only, which can then be recycled. For the classrooms with no recycling bins, new bins are being ordered and those with them have been given new labels, informing people on what can be recycled and what cannot. Furthermore, they have sent out a survey to all students, asking for comments and suggestions on the school's current environmental programme.

Amnesty Group:

The amnesty group are currently preparing to do assemblies in the new term and are discussing fundraising events they want to do and which campaigns and charities they want the school to raise money for.

The first few weeks starting at a new school are always one of the hardest things for students to do but I have been SO impressed and proud of the way Year 7 have started at Test-2018 bourne. lot of saw a



change with the way we focused on transition, from changing the tutoring system, the house system as well as the transition focus. As a school we reviewed everything to try and ensure the transition from Primary / Junior to Secondary was less about change and more about consistent expectations and we have seen the benefit of this difference in approach.

Students arrived in September with fewer concerns about change and more comfort in knowledge. They were ready to succeed by understanding what lay ahead, less pressured by unknowns, more at home in their surroundings and tutors and this has shone through in how quickly the vast majority of students have settled into life here.

Each and every year 7 student has shown me lots of qualities to be proud of, produced some beautiful pieces of work, and represented Testbourne to the highest standard at our recent Lepra event. I frequently tell them how proud they make me as their Head of Year and I look forward to seeing each one develop over the year ahead.

Wellbeing and Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

We always try to promote and advocate the school value of respect and of being respectful to each other. The wellbeing group has been established by Mrs Tanner, Head of Year 8, to assist the younger students and offer them support if needed.

The group is made up of Year 10 students. They have delivered assemblies to KS3 students to educate how to stop bullying and how to be an upstander. They said, "We hope to make all students feel safe both at school and online."

They attended an event presented by representatives of the Diana Award at Bishop Challoner School about how to promote Anti-Bullying in schools.


We have a 'No to Bullying' form on the school website, which allows students to anonymously ask for help from teachers and the mentors.

Leprosy is the oldest known disease in history and is caused by an airborne germ that affects families and communities. It attacks the nerves of the body and causes pain and loss of feeling and disfigurement. Every day, 600 people are diagnosed with Lep-

rosy, of which 50 are children. Last year, Lepra directly improved the lives of 256,000 and reached a further 1.6 million with our health education services.



Each year, Year 7 students raise money for 'Lepra' by taking part in a street dance session as well as holding other fundraising events in their free time for the charity. Last year, Year 7s raised £436 and this they raised an amazing £1739.82. Some of the personal fundraising events included: sponsored walks; a 25-mile swim; selling homemade lemonade; selling homemade cakes; sponsored silences; organised and took part in 5km runs; kicked a football for 6 miles and danced for 2 hours straight. Two students, Gracie and Willow, both managed to raise over £100 each. Every year, Testbourne is so proud of the Year 7s, and even more so this year, as the current year 7s have raised the most in all the years the event has taken place. The dance leaders also commented that the behaviour and positive attitude of our students was one of the best they have ever seen at any of the schools they have worked in. Well done Year 7!

The Mityana ball will be one of the fundraisers and we will keep you posted on dates and how to purchase tickets for this amazing and memorable event.



Girls in Engineering

On Friday 9th November, thirty Year 9 students took part in an engineering programme as a part of the Government's Year of Engineering. This trip was organised in order to encourage young students - in particular female students to consider pursuing a future in engineering. Girls were particularly targeted because only around 7% of engineering graduates are female in the UK.

At the event, organised by local MP Kit Malthouse, students took part in 4 sessions, each with a duration of 30 minutes, completing various challenges, aided by several different companies who attended the event, who also gave inspiring talks. Some of these companies included: Ocado Engineering - who are currently the world's leading food shopping company, Dyson, Xtrac - a company that makes 4WD systems and gearboxes for rally cars, William's Racing, Thatcham Research, Thames Water and RE Aviation - an aircraft engineering company based in Whitchurch. The students also got the opportunity to talk to the company representatives about work experience and possible careers within the companies.

AWE - Inspiring Lecture!



A Year 9 Science class were visited by two graduates from AWE (Atomic Weapons Establishment) who delivered a highly engaging lecture on forces, and launched a challenge for students to participate in. Four students from the class will now be selected to compete in a challenge against other schools. We will keep you updated but here is what Jasmine had to say about the visit:

"Having the AWE Graduates in for a science lesson was a great experience. The topics they mainly focused on were aerodynamics and hydrodynamics. They made sure everyone was involved and engaged. We used a plan, test, evaluate and retest model to improve our paper aeroplanes. They also carried out a few experiments which involved the science behind drag

and thrust. After the experiments they explained the science in a way we could all understand. It was a really good lesson!"

Shakespeare Schools Festival



November 27th was performance day for the cast of Testbourne's entry into this year's Shakespeare Schools Festival. 
their skills ready for their final GCSE coursework submissions. Well done to all students who performed and thank you to all those who attended.




Music Trip - Les Miserables
