Modular Bulidings

Preliminary works began on 12th July 2021 to set up the site compound in order for the main works to start in earnest on the 26th July. There has been a lot of preparation to do by the school, including the decanting of six classrooms and several offices. These areas needed to be totally cleared out ready for Phase 1 of the re-cladding and internal reconfiguration.

During each phase, classrooms will be relocated to three modular double classrooms that have been installed on the school field for the duration of the project. It is a logistical challenge but we are pleased to say the first movement of classrooms happened with minimal disruption to teaching and learning.



The SCOLA project is due to be completed by August 2022.

New Bus Bay

After some unforeseen delays, Testbourne buses are now using the new The Mill Springs bus bay, located just behind our 3G Pitch with school only a short walk up the path. The new bay, provided by the developers of the estate, will ease congestion at the front of the building and the Micheldever Road junction, which in turn will make it safer to walk or cycle to the local schools.

TCS Transition Week

We are excited to announce that, during the week of 23rd August, more than 75% of our incoming Year 7 students will join us for a fun-filled week of activities. One positive that has come from the pandemic is the government's offer of funding for the specific purpose of providing a summer school programme, focusing on transition. Although a week of activities cannot make up for more than a year of disruption and periods of school closure, our aim is for students to experience the following:



- Development of social skills such as team building, leadership skills and communication.
- Experience of practical subjects that would not have been possible during school closure.
- Development of problem-solving skills through activity challenges.
- Building a community with fellow students and TCS staff.

The week will commence with a rotation of eight interactive and practical sessions, delivered by our TCS teachers. Students will have the opportunity to engage with a practical science experiment, make a useful object in design technology, and hone their performance skills in music and drama. Students will also have two Maths and two English sessions to support with any gaps in knowledge.

The second half of the week will be facilitated by WiseUP, an activity provider, and will see our Sports Field turned into an outdoors activity centre! On Wednesday, students will experience The Hub Challenge, which is a series of team-building and problem solving activities, designed to get students working together and engaged with outdoor learning. On Thursday and Friday, students will try their hand at some bushcraft activities, archery and an assault course.

It has been disappointing that our usual transition activities, such as Open Mornings and Transition Day, have not been able to go ahead this year due to national restrictions. We are, therefore, really excited to have the opportunity to meet so many of our incoming students during the summer before they join us in September.

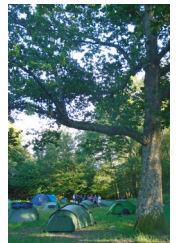
Duke of Edinburgh Award

Testbourne's DofE group were out in the New Forest for a weekend at the end of June, completing their training expedition and returning with tales of fierce ponies and cows encountered, deep swamps that had to be waded or avoided, and times when they were a little lost! A great weekend was had by all, including a wonderful evening and night at Ferny Crofts campsite, with marvellous meals cooked on camp stoves, games, and lots of chat of their time spent walking in the forest.



The DofE group meets every Tuesday evening from January to September, with the aim of supporting students in Year 10 (going into Year 11) to complete their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award. The Award involves students completing four sections of activity – Volunteering, Skills, Physical and Expedition.

This year's group have done an amazing job of persevering despite the January to March lockdown (when we had to meet online instead of in person), and the recent disruption with some students needing to self-isolate. From the students who signed up back in December 2020, we have a core group of 31 Year 10s who are doing well and completing sections of their Award. We look forward to their assessed expedition in September which will involve two days of walking and an overnight camp, with the teams being independent and leading themselves through any obstacles and challenges along the way. Well done to all students involved, and a huge thank you to the wonderful volunteer leaders who give up so much time to support the students with their DofE Awards.



Moreover, a huge congratulations must go to the Year 11s who took part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award during their Year 10 and the start of Year 11. They coped fantastically well with lockdowns, the cancellation of meetings and activities, and with changes to how we could run the DofE Award. Of 30 students who originally signed up, 22 persevered through the six months of lockdown and took part in the assessed expedition in October. They also continued with their other DofE activities including volunteering in their local area in roles from sports coaching to working with youth organisations and charity shops. So far, 13 students have completed their Bronze Award entirely and will receive their certificates and badges on Results Day. Well done to Ffion, Gabbie, Daniel, Lydia, Harrison, Lucy, Will, Evie, Anushka, Jasper, Poppy, Louisa, and Catrin. Along the way the students learned outdoor skills including map reading and campcraft, and developed leadership and teamwork skills. Well done to all!

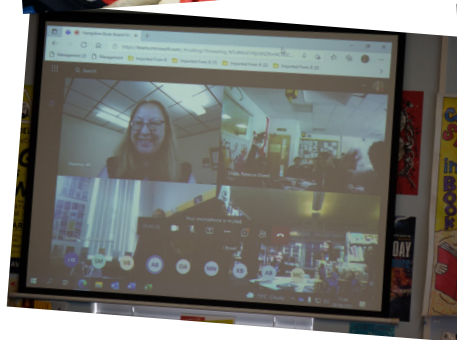
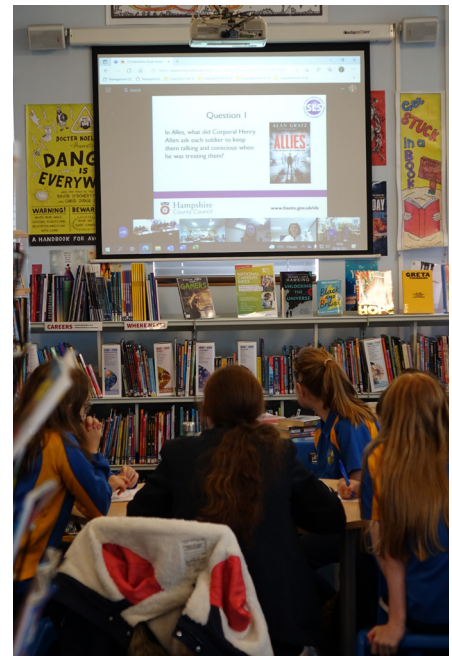


Hampshire Book Awards

Well done Amelia.

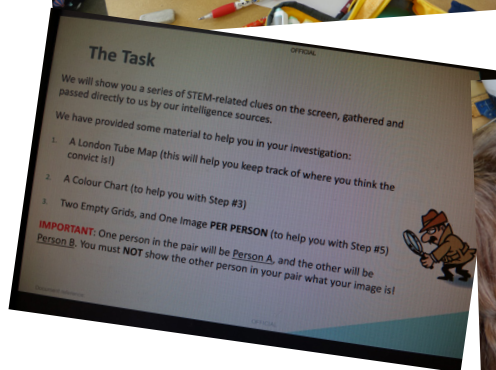
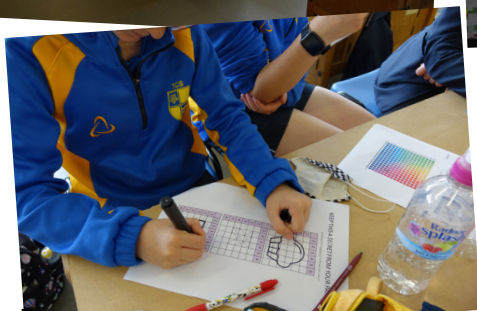
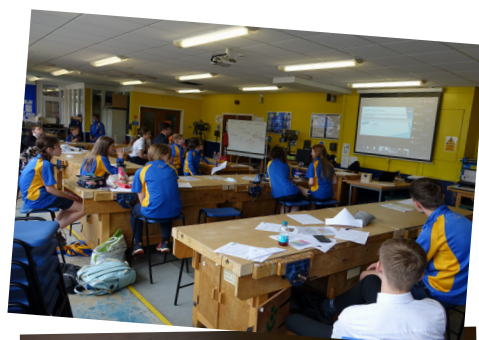
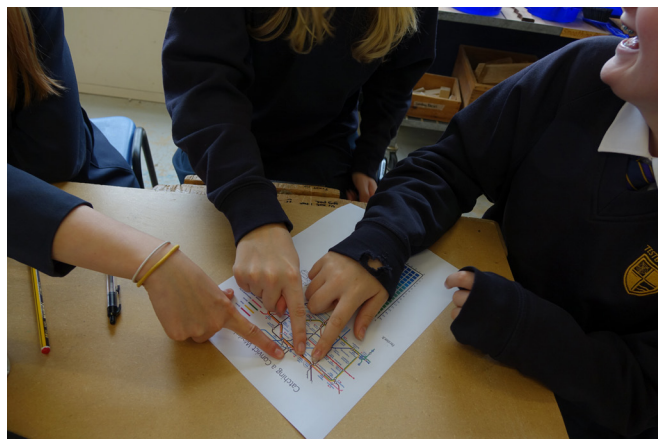


STEM Day

Testbourne STEM students attended EBP South's Inspiring STEM Fair Schools virtual event, during which they took part in activities such as the 'Imagination and Creativity Challenge', 'Guess My Job & Panel', watched experiments, and problem-solved.

The event aimed to engage young people with STEM businesses within their local area, enable young people to recognise local STEM businesses they could work for, and help young people engage in STEM subjects in school.

"For the STEM challenge day we spoke with people who worked at AWE (Atomic Weapons Establishment) which works with the Ministry of Defence. The challenge was to design a robot that was able to collect samples that were contaminated with either Alpha, Beta, or Gamma radiation. We had to calculate the speed required as well as the best materials and how it would safely collect the samples. We then had to feedback our designs to the AWE STEM ambassadors. There was a Q&A session where we were able to find out about their qualifications, career paths and what they liked about their jobs. We then investigated flood prevention and learnt about the different methods used to stop flooding around the coast; the best method was using the 'wave return'. We investigated code breaking and finding solutions to hunt down a criminal using different clues. We were able to ask lots of questions about STEM and careers and learnt a lot about these different subjects." - Mimi Painter

Hampshire County Athletics

Years 9, 10 & 11

On Saturday 12th June Hampshire held their County Athletics Championships at Portsmouth Athletics stadium. Testbourne had three students who were nominated to take part: Charlotte Vickers (Year 9 800m), Arran Topham (Year 11 Long Jump) and Amelia Gray (Year 11 Triple Jump).

The morning session was for Year 9 students; Charlotte practically ran out of her skin and finished in 1st place in a time of 2.24.1, a second ahead of second place. She led from the start and her focus and determination did not fade throughout the race.

Amelia and Arran performed in the afternoon. Unfortunately Arran struggled to time his take off and recorded three no jumps during this competition. However, I would like to say well done to Arran because during his five years at Testbourne he has represented our school at both District and County level in a number of events, including 100m, 200m and the Long Jump and should be incredibly proud of this.

After a long wait, Amelia had her opportunity to jump: her performance was 'outstanding', and not only did she finish in 1st place but she also gained a new personal best of 11m 97cm. Her jump was nearly 30cm more than the winner of the boys' event. As a result of this jump, Amelia was selected to represent Hampshire in the English school's competition which was held in July.



Years 7 & 8



This year's championships were held at Southampton on Wednesday 14th July. Testbourne had a selection of athletes in both Year 7 and 8 who took part on the day.

The students included Year 7 Poppy Taylor, who won the girls 1000m in a time of 3 minutes 10 seconds; this was an exceptional performance by our Testbourne student. She was 7 seconds clear of the second-place runner and was only 3 seconds of the 'Overall Record' for this event: she is a very talented young lady.

Other Year 7 performers took part in the boys' events. Sam Davies and Aly Jarman ran in the 150m race, finishing in 5th place and 6th place respectively. Tom Smallridge finished in 9th place in the 600m. Ethan Burniston and Daniel Jarman finished in 11th and 12th places in the 1000m event.

In the Year 8 events, Freya Hodgekiss finished in 5th place and Zoe Bishop finished in 7th in the girls' 100m, and Isaac Hodges finished in 3rd place in his 100m heat.

Dan Silverwood ran only his second 300m race and recorded a PB time of 45.5 seconds, taking 5th place, while Peter Thompson performed in the 1500m under the very hot sun and finished in 10th place.

One of the last field events of the day was the Year 8 boys' long jump. Participants included Testbourne's Ollie Spinks, who jumped 4m 28cm and finished in 5th place, and Jake Walker who jumped 3m 86cm and finished in 7th place.

All of the Testbourne students were a credit to the school, supporting each other in the individual events as well as cheering on the students from our other local schools; I was very proud to be their team manager at the event.
